

Centennial Tree Planting



Reducing Packaging at the Source

Rebecca's Restaurant is working hard to reduce waste by reducing the amount of plastic that is coming into the restaurant.

Unsatisfied with the amount of packaging that comes from suppliers, Rebecca's Restaurant has made arrangements with suppliers to send products in cardboard boxes instead of plastic. They now get their greens in plastic totes which they wash and reuse instead of having to throw away plastic every time a new order comes into the restaurant.

The Nova Scotia Municipal Government Act provides that council make decisions in the exercise of its powers and duties by resolution, by policy or by by-law. Most of the powers of council in Mahone Bay are exercised by Town by-laws. It is critical that by-laws remain relevant to sustain and direct the development and future of our community.

By-laws should be adjusted on an on-going basis to reflect the issues, needs and preferences of our Town as is required to ensure we have the kind of community where we can foster growth and support economic development while maintaining the character of our community. It can be a precarious balancing act for council.

By-laws need to be 'crafted' by council and staff with input from those knowledgeable in the governance of the topic. This work needs to be done with insight as to what can lay ahead for our Town. Citizens should have an opportunity to offer their own ideas to council particularly on major by-law issues.

Existing by-laws from surrounding communities can provide insightful ideas, opinions, and direction...pick the best of what is out there and adapt it to suit our needs. By-laws should be reviewed and vetted by our legal representatives to identify potential loopholes in the language, which could change the intent of the by-law. By-laws are, as a matter of required process, discussed in a public forum before council issues final approval and before the by-law is submitted to the Department of Municipal Affairs.

By-laws are the parameters we establish to guide our town. It is a critical task to get them right. It should not be dismissed lightly and every citizen should be mindful of a shared responsibility for communicating what they feel works well in their town and what needs to change to keep their town moving in a preferred direction...maintaining that balance.
