TRANSPORTATION ASSETS AT A GLANCE

Mahone Bay's transportation network includes:

- 17 km of Streets
- (\$16,932,324) 6.8 km of Sidewalks (\$3,611,190)
- 334 Signs / Sign Posts (\$232,965)

Values are estimated replacement value

KEY 2020-21 CAPITAL PROJECTS:

\$100,000 for transportation infrastructure improvements / implementation of transportation recommendations (CBCL Ltd., Bicycle Nova Scotia, etc.); to be supplemented by Provincial Connect2 funding

ASSET MANAGEMENT GOALS


Coordinate transportation infrastructure rehabilitation with replacement of water, wastewater and stormwater lines

These Infrastructure Charges pay for important capital projects in wastewater, transportation, parks and facilities, etc.

Gas tax funding from the Federal government also supports Town infrastructure projects.

Did you know? Mahone Bay got its first sidewalk in 1924, cost-shared with local merchants.

STREETS & SIDEWALKS

The Town of Mahone Bay owns and maintains approximately 17 km of public streets and 6.8 km of sidewalks. Towns in Nova Scotia are responsible for all of their streets while the Province looks after paved roads outside of towns.

Public Works staff are responsible for maintenance of streets and sidewalks including asphalt patching, line painting, litter, street sweeping, vegetation control, sidewalk repairs, driveway entrance culverts, snow plowing, road salting, etc.

SNOW AND ICE CONTROL

Snow and ice control operations (i.e. snow plowing, salting and/or sanding of streets, sidewalks, parking lots, etc.) take place when winter weather conditions become hazardous. Vehicles may be towed if they interfere with operations.
